

**Bangladesh-India State, district and local Level Bilateral
Virtual Meeting for Cross-border Malaria Elimination
Meeting Report
27 April 2022**

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Bangladesh-India State, district and local Level Bilateral Virtual Meeting for Cross-border Malaria Elimination, organized by South East Asia Regional Coordination Mechanism Forum (SRCMF) was held on 27 April 2022, through zoom platform. The meeting was chaired by Dr Tanu Jain, Director NCVBDC, leader of Indian delegation.

Dr. Jigmi Singay, Executive secretary Cum Coordinator, SRCMF Secretariat welcomed the delegates. Both Bangladesh and India delegation presented and shared the information on Cross-border districts, areas and point of entry & exit adjoining the international border between the two countries for Malaria elimination. Bangladesh shared the list of names of the focal points and contact details at district and Upazila level for district-to-district coordination, data sharing and synchronization of activities across the borders. Indian States Meghalaya, Tripura and west Bengal agreed to share the list of focal points with their counterparts in Bangladesh and SRCMF.

Both sides agreed for sharing information on any signs or indicators for probable outbreaks or epidemics to facilitate triggering alerts for prevention activities, as and when imported cases (following case investigation) and/or any local upsurge in cases are identified for harmonized responses and timely action. Both countries also agreed to share the information on vector control strategies like LLINs, IRS and LLINs with counterparts.

Two National Malaria Programmes-India and Bangladesh has agreed to have next onsite bilateral meeting in Bangladesh in first week of June. SRCMF agreed to extend support and facilitate in organizing onsite meeting once both the country programs agree on a date.

Opening Remarks

The opening session started with welcome address by Dr Jigmi Singay, Executive Secretary cum Coordinator. He extended warm welcome to the distinguished and eminent Delegates - from Bangladesh lead by Prof. Dr. Nazmul Islam, Director, Diseases Control and Line Director, and India delegation led by Dr. Tanu Jain, Director, National Center for Vector Borne Diseases Control (NCVBDC), MOHFW, Govt. of India and CCM Coordinators from Bangladesh, Resource person and all other participants, who attended this bilateral meeting in spite of their busy schedule. He briefly highlighted the objectives and outcomes of the Bangladesh-India State, district and local level bilateral Virtual meeting for cross-border malaria elimination to the audience.

Appointment of Chair and Co-Chair

The Session started with Executive Secretary Cum Coordinator, SRCMF Secretariat inviting nominations for Chairperson and Co-chairperson for the meeting. Mr Manaj Biswas BCCM Coordinator proposed the name of Dr Tanu Jain, to be Chair and India delegation Leader Dr Tanu Jain proposed name of Prof. Dr. Nazmul Islam, Director, Diseases Control and Line Director, Bangladesh for the Co-chair of the meeting, however in absence of Prof. Dr. Nazmul Islam, Dr Md Abul Kalam Azad was appointed as Co-Chair of the meeting. Dr Jigmi Singay formally invited the Chair and Co-chair and handed over the Chairmanship to Dr Tanu Jain and requested to conduct the bilateral virtual meeting

BUSINESS SESSION

1. Adoption of Agenda

As per the agenda the Chairperson started the business session by inviting comments on the draft agenda. In absence of any comments the draft agenda was adopted.

2. Finalization of Cross-border districts, areas and point of entry & exit adjoining the international border for Malaria elimination

Chair invited India to share list of Cross-border districts, areas and point of entry and exit adjoining Bangladesh for Malaria Elimination.

Delegate from India informed the Chair that India has already shared the list of districts and states bordering Bangladesh (No data was available on port of entry and exit). The list of District and states (Table1) shared by India is given below:

Indian delegate from NCVBDC requested the five Indian States-Assam, Meghalaya, Tripura, West Bengal and Mizoram to support in identification of port of entry and exit (adjoining Bangladesh) and health facility mapping.

Chair thanked the Indian delegate and then invited Bangladesh delegate for the presentation.

Bangladesh delegate thanked India for starting the discussion with Bangladesh. He highlighted that due to increased population movement and migration border areas between India and Bangladesh experience high numbers of imported cases. In this context this meeting is important and timely. He expressed special thanks to SRCMF for pursuing and advancing coordination between India and Bangladesh for accelerating malaria elimination in Cross-border areas/districts. He shared list of Bangladesh cross-border districts, upazila and point of entry/exit (Table2) bordering India

- a) Total malaria endemic districts bordering with India- 12

b) Total malaria endemic upazila bordering with India- 36

Among the 13 districts bordering India, Bandarban is the high burden and high impact district. Three hill stations of chattogram division and Cox's Bazar border with Mizoram account for highest burden of malaria (90%). However, in terms of feasibility, NE Region border districts Netrakona, Mymensingh and Sylhet bordering with Meghalaya in India and Tripura can be considered as preferred area for pilot project as it is accessible from both sides of border areas.

Chair congratulated Bangladesh for detailed presentations. She further added that if these border areas are feasible for initiation of joint cross-border activity, Bangladesh should share pilot project plan/details for implementation in the identified areas/districts to test the viability of executing the project.

She then invited delegates from Meghalaya, West Bengal and Mizoram to share their thought on feasibility of pilot project in their respective states.

Meghalaya delegate added that some of the areas/districts bordering are difficult to access however they can identify easily accessible area for starting the pilot project.

Mizoram shares long border with Bangladesh and three districts bordering Bangladesh namely Mamit, Lunglei and Lawngtlai are highly endemic for malaria like the corresponding areas/district in Bangladesh. Many travelling to neighbouring countries for seeking medical treatment, the travel is increasing rapidly. He highlighted the need for establishment of mechanism for exchange of malaria surveillance data including cross-notification. Being hilly region most of the area is difficult to access therefore online meetings and sharing could be considered

Chair requested Bangladesh to share the details of pilot projects and requested SRCMF to get back to either of the countries in case further information is required

3. Identification of district focal persons and share list of names with contact details at local, district And state level with counterparts and SRCMF for district-to-district coordination, data sharing and synchronization of activities across the borders.

Chair handed over the chairmanship to co-chair and requested to conduct the second half of the bilateral virtual meeting

Co-chair then invited Bangladesh to share the list of focal points

Bangladesh thanked co-chair and share the list of focal points by district and upazila. (Table 3)

Rest of the states were requested to share names and contact details of focal points with SRCMF.

4. Critical information sharing for driving local interventions

- a) Both the countries agreed to share the information of imported cases and source of transmission, event based cross border notification and exchange information on vector control strategies like LLINs, IRS and LLINs with counterparts
- b) Mode of communication to be email
- c) SRCMF to consider involving IDSP and International al Health divisions in future meetings

Chair requested SRCMF to consider involving both the divisions. SRCMF noted the suggestion and said that both the divisions will be taken on board in consultation with NCVBDC.

Chair thanked Dr Jigmi Singay and invited Bangladesh for its presentation.

Bangladesh apprised the participants on Malaria situation analysis in cross border conducted in Bangladesh with WHO support. It involves 5 steps out of which Cross-border malaria assessment has already been done, step 2 is Cross-border malaria assessment in India (to be conducted by WHO), step 3 focuses on G2G meeting, step 4 involves development of roadmap for cross-border collaboration platform for information sharing and surveillance and step 5 district coordination and implementation of work plan developed. He suggested that both countries to work jointly on cross-border plan and start with initiate pilot project for Cross-border malaria elimination in jointly agreed areas /districts.

Chair agreed with all points discussed and requested both the countries to take it forward after getting required approvals.

5. Date, time and frequency of the next onsite bilateral meeting

It was agreed to hold the next India-Bangladesh bilateral onsite meeting in Sylhet, Bangladesh in first week of June 2022.

6. Resource Mobilization

Dr Jigmi Singay informed the delegates that SRCMF is putting up proposal for SAARC Development Fund (SDF) Matching Grant with RBM 2-year Project and further information will be shared well in time with concerned countries for submitting application for SDF matching Grant in the area of malaria elimination

AFTER DELIBERATIONS IT WAS AGREED BY BOTH THE SIDES THAT THE FOLLOWING ISSUES NEED TO BE ADDRESSED URGENTLY IN ORDER TO ACCELERATE MALARIA ELIMINATION IN THE CROSS-BORDER AREA:

- a) Both sides to use Email, SRCMF website etc for sharing data on any signs or indicators for probable outbreaks or epidemics to facilitate triggering alerts for prevention activities, as and when imported cases diagnosed (following case investigation) and/or any local upsurge in cases are identified for harmonized responses and timely action
- b) Both the countries agreed to share the information on vector control strategies like LLINs, IRS and LLINs with counterparts
- c) NE Region border districts Netrakona, Mymensingh and Sylhet bordering with Meghalaya in India and Tripura can be considered as preferred area for pilot project
- d) Bangladesh to share detailed pilot project plan for implementation to test the viability of executing the project.
- e) Border haats can be considered as potential places for Cross-border pilot projects
- f) Next onsite bilateral meeting was proposed in First week of June 2022 in, Bangladesh

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE BILATERAL MEETING:

National Programs

- a) Both sides to use Email, SRCMF website etc for sharing data on any signs or indicators for probable outbreaks or epidemics to facilitate triggering alerts for prevention activities, as and when imported cases (following case investigation) and/or any local upsurge in cases are identified for harmonized responses and timely action
- b) Both the countries to share the information on vector control strategies like LLINs, IRS and LLINs with counterparts
- c) India states offices of Meghalaya, Tripura and West Bengal to share list of focal points with contact details at state, district and local level with their counterparts in Bangladesh and SRCMF
- d) Consider border haats as potential places for Cross-border pilot projects

SRCMF Secretariat:

- a) After discussing with the National Programs to put up a proposal for date for next onsite meeting in June 2022 in Sylhet Bangladesh
- b) facilitate coordination and collaboration mainly at program and local level particularly for those activities which needs joint planning, synchronised implementation of activities for malaria elimination at cross-border area and districts

He also thanked Chair and Co-chair for conducting the meeting efficiently and bringing it to a successful conclusion.
